Voices of Conscience

Our fall worship series, *Voices of Conscience*, is inspired by a traveling exhibit on peacemaking that will premiere at the National WWI Museum in October and then come to Rainbow for the week of October 23-29. Leading up to this important event, we will spend time in worship reflecting on what a Jesus-shaped conscience might sound and look like today.

Over the next few weeks, we have several special speakers lined up to preach on our fall worship theme, *Voices of Conscience*.

This morning: Rainbow congregant, Aaron Barnhart, will share about the formation of the Civilian Public Service program that placed WWII conscientious objectors in alternative service.

October 22: Dr. Drew Hart is a professor at Messiah College and well known theologian, blogger, activist, and author of [Trouble I've Seen: Changing the Way the Church Views Racism](#), a book that utilizes everyday stories, Jesus-shaped theological ethics, and anti-racism frameworks in hopes of transforming the church's understanding and witness in society.

*Note that the RMC Worship Committee will hold a one-evening study session of this book on October 17 at 7 pm in Fellowship Hall. The book is available through Amazon in both Kindle and printed editions.

October 29: Dr. James Juhnke, Professor Emeritus of History, Bethel College, North Newton, Kansas. Dr. Juhnke is currently part of the collaborative team of historians and museum professionals developing the traveling exhibit "Voices of Conscience" at Kauffman Museum.

November 5: Leroy Barber, co-founder of The Voices Project, is known for his work of undoing racism, and has recently taken a lead in the NFL Kneelown initiative, designed to call attention to the way Colin Kaepernick has been blackballed as a result of protesting violence against black people.

As part of Rainbow's participation in the Muted Voices Symposium, 22 members of the Rainbow Choir are joining with 60 voices from UMKC choirs to perform *Dona Nobis Pacem* by Ralph Vaughn-Williams. The performance will be directed by Dr. Robert Bode, Director of Choral Activities at UMKC, and accompanied by piano and string ensemble. This is a major work based on texts from the Hebrew Bible and poetry by Walt Whitman, written as a critique of the violence of war.*

*If you would like to hear the choirs, we've been told that guests may attend the dress rehearsal if you are not registered for the Symposium. Arrive at the WWI Museum at 5:20 on October 19, and tell the usher you are there to listen to the dress rehearsal. We will rehearse for about an hour.
