## <u>Adult Education Classes starting January 8</u> Creation Care and Climate Change

Facilitators: Aaron Barnhart and Kent Lichty

Natural resources are not only vitally important to the economy of Kansas, they have contributed mightily to the quality of life for generations of Kansans. As these resources face unprecedented challenges, people of faith are leading efforts to advocate for what they call "creation care." Leaving behind the old debate over "who caused climate change," these faith communities are looking for common ground to respond to what they agree is a threat to the world that they believe God entrusted to them as stewards. This class will feature discussions and readings for a program being developed for statewide presentation by the Kansas Humanities Council.

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*Religion for Atheists: A Non-believer's Guide to the Uses of Religion* by Alain de Botton Facilitators: Kenn Goertz and Clif Hostetler Cost of book: \$11.37

What if religions are neither all true nor all nonsense? The long-running and often boring debate between fundamentalist believers and non-believers is finally moved forward by Alain de Botton's inspiring new book, which boldly argues that the supernatural claims of religion are entirely false—but that it still has some very important things to teach the secular world.

*Religion for Atheists* suggests that rather than mocking religion, agnostics and atheists should instead steal from it—because the world's religions are packed with good ideas on how we might live and arrange our societies. Blending deep respect with total impiety, de Botton (a non- believer himself) proposes that we look to religion for insights into how to, among other concerns, build a sense of community, make our relationships last, overcome feelings of envy and inadequacy, inspire travel and reconnect with the natural world. For too long non-believers have faced a stark choice between either swallowing some peculiar doctrines or doing away with a range of consoling and beautiful rituals and ideas. At last, in *Religion for Atheists*, Alain de Botton has fashioned a far more interesting and truly helpful alternative.
